Movie and television studios are acting as if they have suddenly discovered a brand new talent. First came *Clueless*, the hilarious retelling of *Emma* for today's hip teens. Then we had a poignant and beautiful *Persuasion*, produced for the BBC in England and released in theaters here; the eagerly awaited Emma Thompson film of *Sense and Sensibility*; and the new television serialization of *Pride and Prejudice*. Yet another movie version of *Emma* is reportedly in production now. Jane Austen may actually gain name-recognition among individuals not noted for frequenting the circulating library. If only she could collect royalties.

With all the Hollywood-style hype have come newspaper and magazine articles that attempt to decipher the reason for the sudden interest in Jane Austen.
